HIGHLIGHTS OF SPEAKERS AND TOPICS



K. Harald Drager (Norway), founding member and President of TIEMS, Mr. Drager has expanded TIEMS to become a worldwide organization with activities in Asia, Europe, the Americas, Africa, and Oceana; Mr. Drager will provide us a **global perspective on emergencies**, the role played by TIEMS and set the context for this conference.



Dr. QU Guosheng (China). Professor and Deputy Director of S&T Committee of the National Earthquake Response Support Service (NERSS) in China; Deputy General Team Leader of China International Search and Rescue Team (CISAR). Dr. Qu has published more than 100 papers in earth science, **earthquake risk analysis, and emergency response**, and he will provide a seasoned perspective from an area of the world with extensive earthquake experience.



Kay Goss (USA). Founding president and CEO for World Disaster Management; former associate FEMA director in charge of national preparedness, training, and exercises for President Bill Clinton. A Fellow, National Academy of Public Administration, Kay will keynote our session on an important contemporary aspect of emergency management — Cyber Security. This session will include presentations on Cyber Security Resilience and Remediation, and Safeguarding Critical Infrastructure from the Inside Out.



Ellis M. Stanley, Sr. (USA). Chairman, Global Board of Directors for The International Association of Emergency Managers (IAEM), will keynote our session on the organizational and "people" aspects critical to emergency management in an interconnected world – "Relationships and the Road to Resiliency". This theme will continue with presentations on Oregon Emergency Management, Past and Future, and an initiative to improve global resilience through education.



Carl Taylor (USA). Executive Director HCH, LLC, Executive Director, Fraser Institute for Health and Risk Analytics, will keynote our session on managing disease outbreaks as a global community. This session will include discussion of recent experience in the Ebola outbreak, and public health measures to improve trust and responsiveness in the interaction between the public, health officials, the medical community, and researchers.



Tom Stahr (USA). Senior Consultant, Environmental Resources Management, Chairman for Disaster Response, National Demolition Association, will provide his perspective on often underappreciated emergency responders – **the demolition and restoration industries**. He will address some of their special challenges in "Recognizing Barriers Preventing Utilization of Skilled Demolition and Removal Resources during a Disaster Response"



Meen B. Poudyal Chhetri (Nepal). President, Nepal Center for Disaster Management; Adjunct Professor, Queensland University of Technology; former Director, Department of Disaster Management, Government of Nepal. Meen will take time out from his emergency management activities in Nepal to give us a first-hand account of recovery efforts following the 25 April, 2015 earthquake.

FIELD TRIP TO MOUNT ST. HELENS

On May 18, 1980, the deadliest and most economically destructive volcanic event in the history of the United States occurred when Mount St. Helens erupted. A massive avalanche triggered by an earthquake of magnitude 5.1 on the Richter scale caused an eruption that reduced the elevation of the mountain's summit from 2,950 m to 2,550 m, replacing it with a 1.6 km wide horseshoe-shaped crater. The Mount St. Helens National Volcanic Monument was created to preserve the volcano and allow for it aftermath to be studied.

On Thursday June 25th we will board a luxury motor coach at noon with box lunches and travel to Mt. St. Helens to survey natural and man-made changes to the landscape and ecosystem, guided by knowledgeable staff at the <u>Johnston Ridge Observatory</u>. After the tour we will stop at a restaurant with great views of the countryside near Mt. St. Helens, where



attendees may purchase dinner or snacks at their option. The bus will then return us to Portland by about 9:30 pm. Lunch, bus trip, and tour are included with conference registration. Dinner or snacks after the tour are to be paid for by attendees.

CONFERENCE VENUE

Our 2015 conference meetings and lunches will be held at the <u>Smith Memorial Student Union</u> (**1825 SW Broadway St**) at Portland State University, in downtown Portland, Oregon, just 20 minutes from the Portland International Airport (PDX).
